1. Chair's announcements

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting. The Chair proposed, and it was agreed, that items 11 & 12 on the agenda should be discussed when Welsh Government officials joined the meeting as it was understood that they had other pressing engagements that would prevent them for participating in the entire meeting.

2. Apologies

3. Declarations of Interest

Because this meeting was conducted as a video conference which prevented the register of interests being circulated, the Chair asked participants in the meeting to declare an interest in each agenda item before speaking.

4. Minutes of last meeting

The minutes of the meeting that took place on the 2^{nd} December 2020 were accepted.

5. Matters Arising

It was considered that most of the matters arising from the last meeting were addressed on the agenda for the current meeting.

Some items raised at the December meeting that were not formally addressed on the agenda were discussed:-

Sand in Penrhyn Dock

James Wilson reported that the Penrhyn Estate has a new land agent who seems to be taking this issue more seriously. No remedial action has yet been taken. James agreed to keep the Association informed of progress, and it was agreed that if a letter of support was needed for addressing this issue it could be provided.

Action: JW, Secretariat

Bangor pier

The Secretariat had spoken to the Pier Master. The Pier Master reported that repair work had been largely completed, and the pier tea rooms were due to open for a take-away service by the end of March 2021. The toilets were not due to be operational until they have been connected to the public sewage system.

6. Register of Interests

No changes were recorded.

7. Financial Update

The financial report was accepted. It was noted that the Association presently has more funds in Reserves than budgeted.

The Secretariat reported that following the proposal by Cllr Mattocks (Beaumaris), the town clerk in Beaumaris had been contacted and a donation had now been made to the Town Council to assist with the renovation of the Happy Valley playground.

It was agreed that with the start of a new Financial Year, both Beaumaris Town Council and Bangor City Council should be approached again and asked to propose projects suitable for support from the Community Fund.

Action: Secretariat

The Secretariat and the Association's accountants had been working to progress VAT registration. The most recent advice from the accountant is that because all of the Association's outputs are VAT exempt, it is not possible to progress this further. Discussions are ongoing to determine if there are other options, and a further update will be provided to the next meeting.

Action: Secretariat

A proposal was set out in the report to extend the payment terms on the invoices issued on 1st April 2021 from one month to six months. This proposal was a response to the post-Brexit export problems that the shellfish industry is presently

experiencing. It was unanimously agreed that this proposal should be implemented.

Action: Secretariat

8. Public Profile of the Association

The Chair and Secretariat reported that regular meetings are now being held with Dr Andy Olivier to ensure that both the Association's website and Twitter account are being used to raise the profile of the Association more effectively. The Chair and Secretariat have worked with Andy to develop a communication strategy for the next few months, as agreed at the last Association meeting.

The number of tweets and profile of the Association continues to grow steadily. It now has over 1,200 followers and had over 21,400 tweet impressions in the 28 days prior to this meeting.

A key part of the communication strategy was to create an identity for the Association and the Menai Strait. All present were asked to provide a picture of themselves and a few paragraphs of text suitable for both Tweeting and posting on the MSFOMA website, to give MSFOMA a "face".

Action: All

All present were reminded of the value of the public profile of the Association and were asked to remember to send items of interest to Andy Olivier for him to Tweet.

9. Welsh Government Activity

Welsh Government officials Michelle Billing and Julian Bray were welcomed to the meeting.

The Secretariat's report was noted and received.

a) Meetings

A meeting of the Welsh Marine Fisheries Advisory Group (WMFAG) had taken place in December.

Trevor Jones is a member of WMFAG. He had tabled a question for the Minister about the importance of making progress with making new Fishery Orders for the Menai Strait at the December meeting of WMFAG, and it was noted that the response had been minuted.

Mr Jones reported that there was concern among WMFAG participants that the fishing industry in general was currently being impacted by both Covid and Brexit, and that Welsh Government support for the industry (both wild capture and cultivated stocks) was inadequate.

b) Consultations

It was noted that the Chair and Secretariat had responded on behalf of MSFOMA to a WG questionnaire about the future of WMFAG during February. The response was discussed and accepted.

c) WG officials

It was noted that regular engagement with WG officials has continued and that this was proving to be beneficial.

10.NW IFCA Activity

The report on recent activities of the NW IFCA was received and accepted by the meeting.

Concerns were again raised about the loss of capacity and continuity among IFCA scientific staff. It was noted that the Association had made an offer to the Authority to assist wherever possible. It was agreed that it would be appropriate to follow up this offer of assistance.

Action: Secretariat

Trevor Jones reported that he was now due to stand down as an appointee to the Authority in June, having served for 10 years. Kim Mould has applied to the Marine Management Organisation to be appointed to the Authority. It was reported that Mr Phil Capper (formerly a Fishery Officer at North Western & North Wales Sea Fisheries Committee) had recently been appointed to the Authority by the MMO. Mr Capper is a Councillor for Conwy County Borough Council and has a long-standing relationship with the mussel fisheries along the North Wales coast.

It was noted that NWIFCA is presently conducting a review of its Policies, Procedures and Governance. It has appointed a firm of consultants to carry out this review, and an online questionnaire is available for stakeholders to record their responses to the review. The Secretariat was asked to circulate information about this review to MSFOMA participants.

Action: Secretariat

11. Menai Strait East Fishery Order

The Chair introduced this item. It was noted that the Association had applied for a new Fishery Order in the eastern Menai Strait in August 2018. The existing Order is due to expire on 31st March 2022. Welsh Government officials were present to provide an update on the process of making a new Order.

Julian Bray and Michelle Billing reported that good progress was being made and that WG should be able to provide a Draft Order suitable to issue for consultation by the end of March.

It was agreed that regular meetings between WG staff and MSFOMA were helpful and that these should be maintained.

Action: Secretariat

There was some discussion of the consultation process, and the Secretariat confirmed that the lead-in time for posting advertisements in the three newspapers (Western Mail, North Wales Chronicle and Fishing News) would be 10 days, so the public consultation was likely to start shortly after Easter.

It was agreed that preparations for this public consultation should continue, and it was also agreed that there should be an informal meeting of MSFOMA participants in late March / early April when the Draft Order was available, to ensure that

everyone involved with MSFOMA was familiar with the content of the Draft Order before it was in the public domain.

Action: Secretariat

12. Menai Strait West

The report was received and discussed.

The Chair and Secretariat reported that in an effort to address the delay in progress with this Fishery Order application that has been caused by uncertainties around Pacific Oysters, they had organised a series of meetings with shellfish farmers from the western Menai Strait and marine scientists from the Marine Centre Wales. Following the most recent meeting a summary of the key research questions had been drafted by Professor Lewis Le Vay from the Marine Centre.

Lewis outlined the questions:-

- **Feral Pacific Oysters** a survey had been carried out in 2019 but not yet written up, and this could provide a useful baseline;
- Potential for spawning some work had already been done on this issue and could usefully be repeated using new seawater temperature data from Menai Bridge;
- Dispersal of larvae a study had been carried out for WG in 2018 and could be repeated once new information on the location of feral oysters was available; and
- Reversion of triploids a desk study to compare the effectiveness of different methods for producing triploids would help to determine the level of risk associated with cultivating triploid Pacific Oysters.

All agreed that investigating these issues would be helpful. Lewis indicated that there would be benefits in collaborating with other research underway in Milford Haven. He also mentioned that Cefas were working on the spread of Pacific oyster larvae from Northern Europe to the south of the UK.

After discussing some aspects of Pacific oyster colonisation of the shoreline of other areas, and also its congener *Crassostrea angulata* (the Portuguese oyster), it was agreed that it would be appropriate to progress these areas of research. It was also agreed that it would be sensible to liaise with WG Science staff before committing to this work to ensure that there was no duplication of effort, and that the issues being investigated would help to inform policy development.

Action: Lewis Le Vay, Secretariat

Lewis indicated that he would be happy to progress this and to explore options for the Shellfish Centre to carry out this work with funding from MSFOMA. He was aware that there was a risk of a personal Conflict of Interest for him, as a Member of MSFOMA, and would liaise with colleagues to address this.

Action: Lewis Le Vay

The Secretariat reported that the next meeting to discuss this issue was scheduled for the 19th March and would provide an opportunity for further discussion.

Kate Griffith and Alex Scorey from NRW both asked if they could join the meeting on 19th March, and it was agreed that they should be invited.

Action: Secretariat

13. Funding proposals & Research Update

Professor Lewis Le Vay provided a brief update on progress with funding and research. In summary:-

- **Pacific Oysters** some areas for research have been identified and are to be progressed (see Item 12 above).
- Bonamia a survey has just been carried out in conjunction with
 the work on the native oyster restoration project in Conwy (the
 concern being the risk of spreading Bonamia as a result of this
 work). The results of this work are expected in the spring / early
 summer.
- Water quality attention is turning to this issue given the increased importance of category "A" shellfish water classification with regard to exports to the EU. Key points were:
 - i. Sources of effluent inputs and discharge monitoring are to be discussed with Dŵr Cymru this week.
 - ii. A virologist at the Shellfish Centre was due to start looking at sources of effluent inputs to the Menai Strait (these can be identified from the types of virus to distinguish agricultural runoff from sewage inputs).
 - iii. Nitrate Vulnerable Zone the decision to make all of Wales a NVZ seemed likely to have a beneficial effect on coastal water quality.
 - iv. Weather events the relationship between shellfish hygiene and weather is an area requiring further research.

James Wilson reported that Dŵr Cymru had been in touch to propose a meeting to discuss their strategy with respect to this outfall which has had problems recently. An update would be provided to the next meeting.

iv. Invasive Alien Species (IAS) / Invasive Non-Native Species (INNS)

Crepidula fornicata - Kate Griffith reported that an NRW marine scientist had found a total of 5 slipper limpets at Abermenai Point at the end of February. NRW are currently requesting funding to carry out survey work in the Menai Strait in the new Financial Year.

Kate requested that any observations of slipper limpets are sent to her, and also that if anyone should survey an area and find no slipper limpets that this information could also be shared to help with survey planning.

Action: All

It was agreed that information about slipper limpets should be put on the MSFOMA website to help raise awareness.

Register and Declarations of Interest

Background

1. Context

- 1.1 One of the principles of public administration in the UK is that organisations and institutions which have been established by the Government to discharge a statutory function do so without acting to benefit the Members or Officers of that institution.
- 1.2 When MSFOMA was established, the potential for conflicts of interest was addressed by including a procedure for registering and reviewing potential conflicts of interest in the Articles of Association (at §18 of the Articles).
- 1.3 For many organisations and institutions, the Government has set out statutory rules and formal guidance which requires that potential "conflicts of interest" are declared and evaluated. Such procedures ensure that individuals do not participate in decisions in which they have some kind of undeclared prejudicial interest.
- 1.4 The Association is a unique organisation, and there are no formal rules in place that apply directly or specifically to its activities. During 2019 the Association developed and implemented its own procedures for declaring, recording and reporting the participants' interests.
- 1.5 The MSFOMA website now includes a list of participants, with their affiliation (Annex A) and also a declaration of interests (Annex B).

2. Update

2.1 During discussions with Welsh Government recently, it has been suggested that the Association could improve its transparency still further. With this in mind, a revised declaration form has been prepared (see Annex C).

Appendices

*The Nolan Principles

1. Selflessness

Holders of public office should act solely in terms of the public interest.

2. Integrity

Holders of public office must avoid placing themselves under any obligation to people or organisations that might try inappropriately to influence them in their work. They should not act or take decisions in order to gain financial or other material benefits for themselves, their family, or their friends. They must declare and resolve any interests and relationships.

3. Objectivity

Holders of public office must act and take decisions impartially, fairly and on merit, using the best evidence and without discrimination or bias.

4. Accountability

Holders of public office are accountable to the public for their decisions and actions and must submit themselves to the scrutiny necessary to ensure this.

5. Openness

Holders of public office should act and take decisions in an open and transparent manner. Information should not be withheld from the public unless there are clear and lawful reasons for so doing.

6. Honesty

Holders of public office should be truthful.

7. Leadership

Holders of public office should exhibit these principles in their own behaviour. They should actively promote and robustly support the principles and be willing to challenge poor behaviour wherever it occurs.

Extracts from the Companies Act 2006

The key sections of the Companies Act that relate to the declaration of interests are reproduced below. The full text of the Act is available at https://www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/2006/46/contents

177 Duty to declare interest in proposed transaction or arrangement

- (1) If a director of a company is in any way, directly or indirectly, interested in a proposed transaction or arrangement with the company, he must declare the nature and extent of that interest to the other directors.
- (2) The declaration may (but need not) be made—
 - (a) at a meeting of the directors, or
 - (b) by notice to the directors in accordance with—
 - (i) section 184 (notice in writing), or
 - (ii) section 185 (general notice).
- (3) If a declaration of interest under this section proves to be, or becomes, inaccurate or incomplete, a further declaration must be made.
- (4) Any declaration required by this section must be made before the company enters into the transaction or arrangement.
- (5) This section does not require a declaration of an interest of which the director is not aware or where the director is not aware of the transaction or arrangement in question.

For this purpose a director is treated as being aware of matters of which he ought reasonably to be aware.

- (6) A director need not declare an interest—
- (a) if it cannot reasonably be regarded as likely to give rise to a conflict of interest;
- (b) if, or to the extent that, the other directors are already aware of it (and for this purpose the other directors are treated as aware of anything of which they ought reasonably to be aware); or
- (c) if, or to the extent that, it concerns terms of his service contract that have been or are to be considered—
- (i) by a meeting of the directors, or
- (ii) by a committee of the directors appointed for the purpose under the company's constitution.

182 Declaration of interest in existing transaction or arrangement

- (1) Where a director of a company is in any way, directly or indirectly, interested in a transaction or arrangement that has been entered into by the company, he must declare the nature and extent of the interest to the other directors in accordance with this section.
 - This section does not apply if or to the extent that the interest has been declared under section 177 (duty to declare interest in proposed transaction or arrangement).
- (2) The declaration must be made—
 - (a) at a meeting of the directors, or
 - (b) by notice in writing (see section 184), or
 - (c) by general notice (see section 185).
- (3) If a declaration of interest under this section proves to be, or becomes, inaccurate or incomplete, a further declaration must be made.
- (4) Any declaration required by this section must be made as soon as is reasonably practicable.

Failure to comply with this requirement does not affect the underlying duty to make the declaration.

(5) This section does not require a declaration of an interest of which the director is not aware or where the director is not aware of the transaction or arrangement in question.

For this purpose a director is treated as being aware of matters of which he ought reasonably to be aware.

- (6) A director need not declare an interest under this section—
 - (a) if it cannot reasonably be regarded as likely to give rise to a conflict of interest;
 - (b) if, or to the extent that, the other directors are already aware of it (and for this purpose the other directors are treated as aware of anything of which they ought reasonably to be aware); or
 - (c) if, or to the extent that, it concerns terms of his service contract that have been or are to be considered—
 - (i) by a meeting of the directors, or
 - (ii) by a committee of the directors appointed for the purpose under the company's constitution.

184 Declaration made by notice in writing

- (1) This section applies to a declaration of interest made by notice in writing.
- (2) The director must send the notice to the other directors.
- (3) The notice may be sent in hard copy form or, if the recipient has agreed to receive it in electronic form, in an agreed electronic form.
- (4) The notice may be sent—
 - (a) by hand or by post, or

- (b) if the recipient has agreed to receive it by electronic means, by agreed electronic means.
- (5) Where a director declares an interest by notice in writing in accordance with this section—
 - (a) the making of the declaration is deemed to form part of the proceedings at the next meeting of the directors after the notice is given, and
 - (b) the provisions of section 248 (minutes of meetings of directors) apply as if the declaration had been made at that meeting.

185 General notice treated as sufficient declaration

- General notice in accordance with this section is a sufficient declaration of interest in relation to the matters to which it relates.
- (2) General notice is notice given to the directors of a company to the effect that the director—
 - (a) has an interest (as member, officer, employee or otherwise) in a specified body corporate or firm and is to be regarded as interested in any transaction or arrangement that may, after the date of the notice, be made with that body corporate or firm, or
 - (b) is connected with a specified person (other than a body corporate or firm) and is to be regarded as interested in any transaction or arrangement that may, after the date of the notice, be made with that person.
- (3) The notice must state the nature and extent of the director's interest in the body corporate or firm or, as the case may be, the nature of his connection with the person.
- (4) General notice is not effective unless—
 - (a) it is given at a meeting of the directors, or
 - (b) the director takes reasonable steps to secure that it is brought up and read at the next meeting of the directors after it is given.

Financial Update

Background

The purpose of this report is to advise the Association on its current financial status with respect to the revised Financial Plan agreed in December 2020, and to review items of financial significance.

Recommendations

1. The update on actual and budgeted income and expenditure for the 2020-21 FY is received.

1. Background

- 1.1 The Association agreed a budget and Financial Plan in January 2018 for a period of 5 years. The key aspects of this Plan were that it should maintain a Reserve of at least £25,000 to cover costs associated with the renewal of Fishery Orders, and also that lease fees should be inflated at a rate of 2.8% pa.
- 1.2 The Financial Plan was revised at the December 2020 MSFOMA AGM. A summary of the revised Financial Plan is set out in Annex A of this report. Note that this covers the period until the end of the 2021-22 FY.
- 1.3 It is appropriate for the Association to keep all aspects of this Plan under review, and an update is provided in this report.

2. Budget & Finance update

2.1 An income and expenditure report for the Association for the MSFOMA 2020-21 Financial Year (starting on 1st March 2020) is presented in Table 1 overleaf. This table shows both the actual and budgeted values for each item of income and expenditure.

- 2.2 Key points to note are that:
 - a) Expenditure was £10,842.25 lower than expected. This was due to delays in progress with the renewal of the two Fishery Orders.
 - b) The Association finished the FY with a Reserve of £43,947.65. This value is more than the target Reserve of £34,804.37.

3. Invoices for layings in 2021

- 3.1 It was agreed at the March 2021 Association meeting that the usual 30-day deadline for payment of invoices issued in April 2021 should be extended to a period of 6 months. This extension was implemented to provide time for resolution of the problems preventing exports to the EU and also give businesses some time to recover from the impact of Covid-19.
- 3.2 The Association's views are sought on this proposal and on any other ways in which shellfish farming businesses can be assisted at this difficult time.

4. Community Fund

4.1 Beaumaris Town Council and Bangor City Council have both been asked to propose projects for support from the MSFOMA "Community Fund" no proposals have yet been received.

Public Profile of the Association

Background

The public profile of the Association has been a recurring agenda item for several years. The purpose of this agenda item is to ensure that we communicate news of the activities of the Association and the mussel farming industry in the Menai Strait as effectively as possible. This report provides an update on some recent discussions and proposals to improve our public profile.

Recommendations

- 1. That the Association note the work that is being done to raise the public profile of the Association.
- 2. All MSFOMA participants provide a photograph and brief resume that is suitable for both publication on the MSFOMA website and on Twitter.

1. Background

- 1.1 The main avenues for the Association to present its public profile are through its website (www.msfoma.org) and its Twitter account (@MSFOMA1). The Association has considered other communication mechanisms (such as Facebook and Instagram) but concluded some time ago that the combination of a website and Twitter was best suited to both our needs and our capacity to engage with a wider audience.
- 1.2 The roles served by the website and Twitter account are related but distinctly different.
 - a) The MSFOMA website is used to communicate the "nuts and bolts" information about the Association: our role, remit and membership. It also provides a platform for interested parties to sign up to receive e-mail newsletters about MSFOMA activities.
 - b) The MSFOMA Twitter account is more dynamic and is used to communicate more ephemeral information and items of passing interest (such as the current harvesting activity in the Strait; a new recipe; or an upcoming meeting with the Minister).
- 1.3 The Association's website is maintained by the Secretariat, and the Twitter account by Dr Andy Olivier, formerly a student at the Marine Centre in Menai Bridge. Dr Olivier was given this role after making a detailed presentation on social media at an Association meeting in 2018.

2. Developing the public profile

2.1 In response to discussions at recent MSFOMA meetings, the Chair and Secretariat have been working with Andy Olivier to develop a more coherent communication strategy for the Association. Monthly meetings are being held to refine and implement this strategy.

2.2 Both Twitter and the Association's website were used to good effect during the recent consultation on the Menai East Fishery Order (see item 11 on the agenda). Key stages in the consultation process were publicised using both media, with the larger documents hosted on the website and smaller excerpts of these documents and links to them being hosted on Twitter. A simple communication strategy and timeline covering the next few months for this area of work has been drafted and is presented below for comment.

Welsh Government Activity

Background

The Welsh Government is responsible for managing inshore fisheries in Wales. This report provides a brief update on some Welsh Government Activities that may be relevant to the work of MSFOMA.

Recommendations

- 1. That the report is received, along with any verbal updates from the Welsh Government officials invited to the meeting.
- 2. That the Association should keep a watching brief on the new Fisheries Bill to ensure it doesn't have any adverse unintended consequences for shellfish aquaculture.

1. Background

1.1 The Welsh Government website provides information about consultations and meetings of various stakeholder groups that are relevant to the Welsh Fishing industry. A brief summary of recent activity is provided below.

2. Meetings of Fisheries Groups

- 2.1 Welsh Government has established several groups to assist with the administration and management of Welsh fisheries. The key groups are:
 - a) **Inshore Fisheries Groups** these groups were established to provide stakeholders with a forum for communicating and engaging with Welsh Government. They were disbanded several years ago, and at the same time the membership of the Welsh Marine Fisheries Advisory Group (WMFAG) was broadened and supported by ad-hoc "Task and Finish" groups. The most recent WMFAG meeting resolved to maintain this arrangement and to review its effectiveness in December 2020.
 - b) Welsh Marine Fisheries Advisory Group (WMFAG) this group was established to assist with the formulation of appropriate policies, plans, strategies and laws relating to marine fisheries in Wales. Information about this group is now available from https://beta.gov.wales/wales-marine-fisheries-advisory-group. The most recent published WMFAG minutes were for the meeting on 15th September 2020 (published on 10th December 2020 here), which were reported and discussed at the last MSFOMA meeting. There is no news of further meetings.
 - c) Aquaculture Advisory Group this Group was established to help Welsh Government meet the targets it set in the 2013 Wales Marine and Fisheries Strategic Action Plan for aquaculture production of 2,000t of finfish and 16,000t of shellfish by 2020. No meetings of this group have taken place recently. The most recent WMFAG meeting confirmed that the AAG has been "...suspended following poor attendance and dissatisfaction." WMFAG further resolved to remove a reference to the AAG from its own Terms of Reference "...as that sub-group was disbanded."

2.2 Members and Observers at the Association meeting will be asked for a verbal update on any recent meetings of these and related groups that are not reported on the Welsh Government website.

3. Consultations

- 3.1 There are presently no open consultations for "Marine and Fisheries" on the Welsh Government website (<u>here</u>) that are directly relevant to MSFOMA.
- 3.2 It is noted that a UK-wide consultation on the conservation of dolphins, porpoise and minke whales is underway (hosted on the Scottish Government website here) and is due to end on the 14th June 2021. These species do not frequent mussel fishing areas, nor are there any records of interaction with them over the years. It does not, therefore, seem to be necessary for MSFOMA to submit a response to this consultation.

4. Welsh Government Officials

4.1 There have been regular formal and informal discussions over the phone and in telephone conference calls with WG officials about various issues connected with the renewal of the two Fishery Orders in the Menai Strait (see items 11 & 12 on the agenda).

5. Communications with Cabinet Minister

5.1 There have been no communications with the Cabinet Minister since the last MSFOMA meeting.

North West Inshore Fisheries and Conservation Authority <u>Activity</u>

Background

The North West Inshore Fisheries and Conservation Authority (NWIFCA) are responsible for managing sea fisheries including mussel fisheries in the coastal waters lying between the Dee and the Solway Firth. This area includes the UK's largest seed mussel resource, which is vital to the ongoing success of the Menai Strait mussel fishery. This report provides a brief update on NWIFCA activities that could have an impact on the Menai Strait mussel fishery.

Recommendations

- 1. That the report is received.
- 2. That the Association should keep the need for a Morecambe Bay Mussel Management Plan on the future agenda for NWIFCA.

1. IFCA Meetings

1.1 Since the last meeting of the Association the NW-IFCA has held a quarterly meeting on the 18th March 2021. A meeting of the Technical, Science and Byelaws Sub-Committee was due to be held on 18th May 2021 but was cancelled. The next quarterly meeting is scheduled to take place on 6th July, and the next TSB meeting is scheduled for 17th August 2021.

2. Changes to Byelaws

2.1 There are no proposals to alter any NWIFCA byelaws at its next meeting.

3. Bivalve Mollusc Working Group

3.1 No meetings of the Bivalve Mollusc Working Group have taken place since the last MSFOMA meeting.

4. Staff changes

- 4.1 It was reported to the last MSFOMA meeting that the NWIFCA were carrying out a recruitment process to fill the role of Senior Scientist. The deadline for applications was the 15th March 2021. There is not, as yet, any indication that a new Senior Scientist has been recruited.
- 4.2 It is understood that an existing member of staff, Mr Jonathan Haines, is presently filling the role of Senior Scientist. Another existing member of staff, Mr Elliott Waltho, has moved from the IFCA enforcement team to the science team. Nonetheless, the staff changes at the NWIFCA mean that the science team is presently short of staff and will need to rebuild its expertise over a period of time.

- 4.3 At the request of Trevor Jones and Jim Andrews (who are both MMO appointees to NWIFICA), the February meeting of the Technical, Scientific and Byelaws sub-Committee considered the research priorities for the IFCA in 2021. The surveys of cockle and mussel beds were prioritised, but the sub-Committee endorsed the Officers' recommendation that it would not be possible to proceed as intended with the implementation of the Morecambe Bay Mussel Management Plan.
- 4.4 Given the long-term importance of the Morecambe Bay Mussel Management Plan to the shellfish farmers in the Menai Strait, it will be important to also keep this item on the agenda for NWIFCA action, though it has to be accepted that this is unlikely to happen before 2022.

Menai Strait Oyster & Mussel Fishery Order 1962

Background

The Menai Strait Oyster and Mussel Fishery Order was made in 1962 and provides the legal foundations for the mussel fishery in the eastern Menai Strait. The Order is the basis for the most successful and productive aquaculture area in Wales.

The Order was made for a period of 60 years and is due to expire on 31st March 2022. MSFOMA needs to ensure that a new Fishery Order is in place by this time to protect the local businesses and jobs that depend upon it.

This report considers the recent progress that has been made with the process for making a new Fishery Order.

Recommendations

- 1. That the report is received
- 2. That the outcome of the consultation process is noted.
- 3. That the Association endorse the actions set out in section 5 of this report to ensure that progress with the making of a new Fishery Order is maintained.

1. Introduction

1.1 The Menai Strait Fishery Order sets out provision for both the cultivation of mussels and oysters and for the regulation of the fishery for wild mussels in the eastern end of the Menai Strait. It has been the most successful Fishery Order in the UK.

2. Renewal of the Fishery Order

- 2.1 The existing Fishery Order will expire on 31st March 2022. Discussions with WG officials about the replacement of this Order started in 2013, and the formal application for a new Fishery Order was submitted to the Cabinet Secretary for Environment and Rural Affairs (now the Minister for Environment, Energy & Rural Affairs) on the 9th August 2018.
- 2.2 Since the last meeting of the Association in March 2021, the Minister has provided the Association with a Draft Order to replace the existing Order. This Draft Order was discussed at an Extraordinary Meeting of the Association on the 30th March 2021, prior to the consultation on the Draft Order commencing on 8th April 2021.
- 2.3 This report provides an update on the consultation process and feedback on the Draft Order, as well as an indication of the timetable for progress.

3. Consultation

3.1 The requirements to consult on the Draft Order are set out in Schedule 1 of the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 and also specified in the directions given by the Minister. These were reported to the Extraordinary meeting in March 2021. In summary, these

statutory directions require that a consultation is conducted for a period of one month and that all of the land owners and occupiers of the seashore and adjoining land are consulted (see Annex A).

- 3.2 In response to these directions, the Secretariat carried out the following actions:
 - a) An advertisement (copy at Annex B) was placed in three publications on the 8th April 2021:
 - i. Fishing News,
 - ii. Western Mail,
 - iii. Daily Post;
 - b) Copies of the advert were placed in handbill form where fishermen and other interested parties may see it at the 18 locations shown in Annex C, and were on display at these locations throughout the consultation period;
 - c) Letters were sent to a list of interested parties previously agreed with Welsh Government (Annex D);
 - d) E-mails were sent to a list of 131 interested parties (Annex E);
 - e) The draft Order was made available for inspection on demand on the MSFOMA website, and arrangements were made to provide paper copies as required.
- 3.3 Welsh Government also alerted stakeholders on their own database of the consultation on 24th March 2021. A copy of the e-mail and accompanying correspondence sent to these stakeholders is provided at Annex F.
- 3.4 In addition to these formal requirements, MSFOMA carried out the following actions using its website and Twitter account:
 - a) Immediately after the extraordinary meeting had approved the consultation process on 30th March 2021:
 - i. The impending consultation was announced on both the Association's website and on Twitter; and
 - ii. An e-mail announcing the impending consultation was sent to all stakeholders on the Association's mailing list for the eastern Menai Strait (including all MSFOMA members).
 - b) At the start of the consultation phase on 8th April 2021:
 - i. The start of the consultation was announced on both the Association's website and on Twitter;
 - ii. Information about the new Order and the consultation process was published on the MSFOMA website; and

- iii. An e-mail was sent directly to all individuals and organisations on the Association's mailing list for the eastern Menai Strait.
- c) During the consultation period:
 - i. The progress of the consultation was publicised on both Twitter and the MSFOMA website:
 - ii. The Twitter account was used to confirm that the new Order is a "like for like" renewal of the existing Order in response to some social media activity suggesting otherwise.

4. Consultation responses

4.1 The outcome of the consultation process is summarised in the table below:

- 4.2 This consultation outcome is very favourable. Members will recall that the last time that MSFOMA carried out a consultation for a new Fishery Order was in 2015 for the Menai West Order. That consultation exercise resulted in over 70 responses, including dozens of objections.
- 4.3 An acknowledgement thanking each respondent for their input has been sent by the Secretariat for the responses that were sent to MSFOMA.
- 4.4 The Association is advised that:
 - a) **Numbers of responses are tentative** this is because a some of the respondents did not follow the request to respond to both Welsh Government and MSFOMA, and chose to respond only to Welsh Government. This, coupled with GDPR requirements and the reluctance of some respondents to allow their responses to be sent in full to MSFOMA has complicated the process of checking the overall number of responses.
 - b) Late responses two late responses were received (one an objection, the other a neutral comment), and that these are included in the numbers above. The status of these late comments is only likely to become an issue if the Minister should call a Public Inquiry, at which point the Association may wish to argue that late submissions are inadmissible. Until such time it is appropriate to acknowledge these responses (one of which was sent to both MSFOMA and Welsh Government, the other which was sent to Welsh Government alone).

- 4.5 A list of all of the respondents and the full text of each response has been included as a separate 56-page Supplementary Report to these papers.
- 4.6 Some of the responding organisations and individuals may be unfamiliar. A quick summary of the status of each individual and organisation responding is provided below for reference, along with hyperlinks (where available) for each organisation.
 - a) **Baron Hill Estate** this Estate is a significant local landowners, with title to areas of foreshore adjacent to the Fishery Order area. http://baronhillestate.co.uk/
 - b) Conway Club Cruising Association it is not clear which organisation this is. The website for the Conway Club Cruising Association relates to the old HMS Conway sail training vessel (rather than Conwy in North Wales) and lists a different Commodore; however this website does not seem to have been updated since March 2010 (http://www.hmsconway.org/cruising.html). The parent "Conway Club" does not list Mr Butterfield among its current Club Committee members (https://www.theconwayclub.org/people/). Google searches for the "Conwy Cruising Club" show now website, but do contain results for the North Wales Cruising Club which is based in Conwy but which does not list Mr Butterfield as its Commodore. Further enquiries will be made to determine the status and locus of this organisation.
 - c) **Cruising Association** this is based in London which is "dedicated to those who cruise on small boats" (www.theca.org.uk/public/about). Correspondence has been received from Derek Lumb and Nigel Robinson of this Association.
 - d) **Deepdock Ltd** is a fishing company based on Anglesey that leases some of the layings in the existing Fishery Order area.
 - e) **Dr Sue Utting** is the former Chair of MSFOMA and prior to that was a fisheries scientist based at the fisheries laboratory in Conwy.
 - f) **Maritime and Coastguard Agency (MCA)** this is a UK Government agency sponsored by the Department of Transport that works to prevent the loss of life on the coast and at sea. https://www.gov.uk/government/organisations/maritime-and-coastguard-agency
 - g) **Myti Mussels Ltd** is a shellfish farming company based in Port Penrhyn that leases some of the layings in the existing Fishery Order area.
 - h) **Natural Resources Wales (NRW)** is the largest Welsh Government Sponsored Body, and is the principal advisor to Welsh Government about issues relating to the environment and its natural resources. https://naturalresources.wales/?lang=en
 - i) **North Wales Wildlife Trust (NWWT)** is an environmental Non-Governmental Organisation based in North Wales and committed to enabling wildlife to survive and thrive across north Wales. https://www.northwaleswildlifetrust.org.uk/
 - j) **North West Venturers Yacht Club** the website of this club reports that it was founded in 1961 and that it exists to foster good seamanship, training members and sailing in company. It was incorporated on 21st December 2020. Its

- clubhouse is at Gallows Point, Beaumaris. The President of the NWVYC is Derek Lumb. https://nwvyc.org.uk
- k) Royal Yachting Association (RYA) is national governing body for dinghy, yacht and motor cruising, all forms of sail racing, RIBs and sportsboats, windsurfing and personal watercraft and a leading representative for inland waterways cruising. https://www.rya.org.uk/
- l) **UK Hydrographic Office (UKHO)** is a UK Government Executive Agency sponsored by the Ministry of Defence that specialises in marine geospatial data (i.e. maps) to support safe, secure and thriving oceans. https://www.gov.uk/government/organisations/uk-hydrographic-office
- m) **Welsh Fishermen's Association (WFA-CPC)** is the national representative body of the Welsh fishing industry. https://welshfishermensassociation.wordpress.com/
- n) Ynys Môn County Council (YMCC) is the county council for Ynys Môn, with a wide range of interests and responsibilities. The key interests of YMCC in connection with the Fishery Order are its role as the Harbour Authority between Menai Bridge and Ynys Seiriol (Puffin Island); as lessee of the foreshore and seabed around much of Anglesey from The Crown Estate; as the operator of the piers at Menai Bridge and Beaumaris, and as the lessor of moorings in the Menai Strait. https://www.anglesey.gov.uk/en/Residents/Residents.aspx
- 4.7 The main issues raised in the objections to the new Fishery Order are summarised in the table overleaf. For each issue, a list of the organisations raising the same concern is also provided.
- 4.8 The issue of concern emerging from the consultation that was raised more than any other single issue is the concern that the new Order may have an impact on moorings used by leisure craft in the Menai Strait (5 of the 8 objectors raised this issue). With regard to this issue, the Association is advised that:
 - a) This is a long-standing issue that has been raised in the past in particular with respect to the deep water moorings in Beaumaris Bay.
 - b) Moorings are not made illegal by the granting of a Fishery Order;
 - c) There is a possibility that the lessee of a laying in the Fishery Order could take legal action in response to the harm caused to their shellfish by a mooring that was placed on that laying. This risk only exists in the layings (i.e. not in the areas outside the layings), so the request to exclude the area outside the layings to remove the risk is *non-sequitur* the risk does not exist in the areas that are not layings.
 - d) The Association has accommodated and respected the location of existing moorings (notably at Glyn Garth where the creation of the new "Bangor Deep" laying specifically and deliberately excluded areas used for moorings.
 - e) Finally, the new process proposed by Welsh Government for creating a "designated area" for layings before leases are issued creates two opportunities

for stakeholder input to be takin into account: the designated area has to be approved by the Minister; and the terms of new leases also have to be approved by the Minister.

5. Actions for MSFOMA

- 5.1 The timescale for renewal of the Order is now pressing there is now a period of less than 10 months to complete the remainder of the process of making formally making the new Order. The Association is advised that if there is to be no loss of continuity, the new Order will need to be formally laid before Senedd Cymru on or before 10th March 2022 for the statutory period of 21 days.
- 5.2 During the period between this meeting and the 10th March 2022, the Minister will need to consider whether or not it is appropriate to appoint an Inspector to make an Inquiry concerning the Order and allow time for such an Inquiry to take place; or whether instead to either refuse or to settle and make an Order in such form and containing such provisions as seem expedient (see Annex A of this report).
- 5.3 Before asking the Minister to make such a determination, adequate responses could be sent by MSFOMA to the objectors to address the points that they have raised and to provide each objector with the opportunity to either uphold or withdraw their objection. It had been hoped that this process would have been completed by the time of this meeting but that has not been possible. An update will be provided to the meeting on progress with the process of responding to objectors.
- 5.4 If the new Fishery Order follows the form of the draft Order that was issued for consultation, it will give rise to some new procedures and duties for MSFOMA. If the Association is to ensure that the cultivation and sale of shellfish from the Fishery Order area can continue without interruption, we need to make the appropriate preparations well in advance. The main areas where preparations need to be made are considered to be:
 - a) **Creating of a "Designated Area"** this is a requirement under §4 of the Draft Order. Before any layings for cultivation are leased out, the Minister must first of all approve a "Designated Area".
 - The wording of the Order is not clear about whether there should be an individual "Designated Area" for each of the 8 layings, or whether just a single "Designated Area" would be needed, covering all of the layings. On the assumption that it is the latter, the geographic extent of the "Designated Area" is illustrated in Annex G of this report for comment.
 - b) **Ministerial consent to lease** all or part of the several fishery area this is a requirement under §8(2) of the Draft Order. The request must be made in writing and must include
 - i. A copy of a draft lease; and
 - ii. A statement from the Grantee (MSFOMA) in support of this request.
 - c) Leasing vacant layings §12 of the Draft Order sets out a procedure for the Association to follow in the event that a laying becomes vacant. To ensure that the Association can make the transition between the existing 1962 Order and the new 2022 Order without any loss of continuity, a new administrative procedure will be needed. A proposed revision to the existing procedure is set out in Annex H of this report.

- 5.5 It will become immediately apparent that the swift execution of these new responsibilities by the Minister will be vital if there is to be no loss of production from the area. The Minister's power to consent to the designated area, the layings, and the leases will only come into existence when the new Fishery Order comes into force (on 1st April 2022). Unless the Minister is in a position to issue all of the necessary consents and authorisations immediately on that date, there will be an equally immediate impact on the businesses that operate in this area.
- 5.6 Guidance from WG officials will be sought on how to manage the transition between Fishery Orders and ensure that the Minister is able to issue the necessary consents on 1st April 2022, and reports on progress will be made at the September and December Association meetings.
- 5.7 The Association will appreciate that if the terms and requirements of the Order were to change from the Draft Order issued for consultation, then new responsibilities and duties may arise. The Chair and Secretariat will remain alert for any such changes and seek to develop appropriate responses swiftly.

Annex A: Schedule 1 of the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 (as amended by the Marine & Coastal Access Act 2009).

SCHEDULES

SCHEDULE 1 Section 1.

PROVISIONS WITH RESPECT TO MAKING OF ORDERS UNDER SECTION 1

- **1** Where an application for an order under section 1 of this Act is made to the appropriate Minister, that Minister may either refuse the application or prepare a draft order and serve a copy of it on the applicants.
- **2** Where a draft order is prepared and a copy thereof served on the applicants under paragraph 1 above, the applicants shall cause printed copies of the draft order to be published and circulated in such manner as the appropriate Minister thinks sufficient and proper for giving information to all parties interested, and shall give notice of the application, in such manner as that Minister directs or approves, to the owners or reputed owners, lessees or reputed lessees, and occupiers, if any, of the portion of the sea shore to which the proposed order relates and of the lands adjoining thereto.
- **3** During the period of one month after the first publication of the draft order under paragraph 2 above, the appropriate Minister shall receive any objections or representations made to him in writing respecting the proposed order.
- 4 (1) The provisions of this paragraph shall have effect where any objection with respect to the proposed order which the appropriate Minister considers to be neither frivolous nor irrelevant has been duly made to that Minister under paragraph 3 above and has not been withdrawn.
- (2) Where he considers it appropriate to do so, the appropriate Minister may The appropriate Minister shall as soon as conveniently may be after the expiration of the period of one month referred to in paragraph 3 above appoint some fit person to act as inspector respecting the proposed order.
- (3) The inspector shall proceed to make an inquiry concerning the subject matter of the proposed order, and for that purpose to hold a sitting or sittings in some convenient place in the neighbourhood of the portion of the sea shore to which the proposed order relates and thereat to take and receive any evidence and information offered, and hear and inquire into any objections or representations made respecting the proposed order with power from time to time to adjourn any sitting.
- (4) The inspector may for the purpose of the said inquiry take evidence, and by summons under his hand require the attendance of any person, and examine him and any person who attends before him, on oath or otherwise, as he thinks expedient, and may administer an oath or take any affidavit or declaration for the purposes of the inquiry.
- (5) Any person so summoned who, after tender to him of his reasonable expenses, refuses or neglects to obey the summons, and any person who refuses or neglects to answer any question which the inspector is authorised to ask, shall be guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 1 on the standard scale.
- (6) Not less than twenty-eight days notice shall be published in such manner as the appropriate Minister may direct of every sitting of the inquiry other than an adjourned sitting.
- (7) The inspector shall make a report in writing to the appropriate Minister, setting forth the result of the inquiry, and stating whether in his opinion the proposed order should be made, with or without alteration, specifying any alteration he recommends and his reasons therefor, and stating the objections and representations, if any, made on the inquiry and his opinion thereon.
- (8) In the application of this paragraph to Scotland, in sub-paragraph (4) for the words "summons under his hand" there shall be substituted the words "an order signed by him", and in sub-paragraph (5) for the words "summoned" and "summons" there shall be substituted the words "ordered" and "order" respectively.

- **5** Without prejudice to paragraph 4 above, the appropriate Minister may, in the case of any proposed order, cause any such inquiry as he thinks fit to be held with respect thereto.
- **6** As soon as conveniently may be after the expiration of the period of one month referred to in paragraph 3 above or, in a case where an inspector has been appointed under paragraph 4 above, after the receipt by the appropriate Minister of any report of the inspector under paragraph 4(7) above, that Minister shall, after considering the objections or representations, if any, that have been made with respect to the proposed order and any such report, either refuse the application or settle and make an order in such form and containing such provisions as he thinks expedient.
- 7 Where the appropriate Minister makes an order under section 1 of this Act, the applicants for the order shall cause notice of the making of the order to be published in such manner as that Minister thinks sufficient for giving information to all parties interested and shall give notice of the making of the order, in such manner as that Minister directs or approves, to the owners or reputed owners, lessees or reputed lessees, and occupiers, if any, of the portion of the sea shore to which the order relates and of the lands adjoining thereto.
- **8** All expenses incurred by the appropriate Minister in relation to any application for an order under section 1 of this Act or to any order made in consequence thereof shall be defrayed by the applicants; and the appropriate Minister shall, if he thinks fit, on or at any time after the making of the application, require the applicants to pay to him such sum as he thinks requisite for or on account of those expenses, or to give security to his satisfaction for the payment of those expenses on demand.





I am writing to consult you on a proposal to make a new "Fishery Order" in the eastern Menai Strait. The purpose of this new Fishery Order is to enable shellfish farming to continue in the Menai Strait just as it does today when the existing Fishery Order expires next year.

The new Fishery Order has been drafted by the Welsh Ministers in response to a formal application submitted by the Menai Strait Fishery Order Management Association ("MSFOMA") under the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967. The Welsh Ministers have instructed MSFOMA to carry out this consultation on the Draft Order.

The purpose of the new Fishery Order is to allow existing shellfish farming to continue in the eastern end of the Strait. The new Order will not impose any new restrictions or controls on existing day-to-day activities in the area. For shellfish famers this new Fishery Order is vital for their future. For everyone else in the area it will be very much "business as usual".

In accordance with the Ministers' instructions, we are writing to consult with you and other interested parties. We have also issued Public Notices in the Fishing News, Western Mail and Daily Post, and have posted notices at locations around the eastern Menai Strait. I attach a copy of the Public Notice for your information. Additional information, including an electronic copy of the Draft Order and map of the area concerned, is also available on the MSFOMA website (www.msfoma.org). If you would like a paper copy of any of these documents please contact us and we will send them to you free of charge.

The consultation period for this Fishery Order will extend from 8th April 2021 – 8th May 2021. If you have any comments that you would like the Minister to consider before making this Order, please can you send them to <u>both</u> Welsh Government and MSFOMA at the following postal addresses:-

MENAI STRAIT (EAST) PROPOSED FISHERY ORDER


The Menai Strait Fishery Order Management Association (MSFOMA) have applied to the Welsh Ministers for a Regulating and Several Order, under the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 (as amended), which would confer on them both the right of regulating a fishery and of a several fishery for oysters and mussels in the eastern Menai Strait.

A hybrid Fishery Order (several and regulating) was granted to the North West and North Wales Sea Fisheries Committee for the production of mussels and oysters at the east end of the Menai Strait (Menai East), under the Sea Fisheries Act 1868, for a period of 60 years in 1962.

When the North West and North Wales Sea Fisheries Committee was abolished in 2010 the Committee's functions, property, rights and liabilities under the 1962 Order were transferred to the Menai Strait Fishery Order Management Association (MSFOMA). MSFOMA was established, following consultation by the Welsh Ministers, in 2010 as a company limited by guarantee. Its objects include, amongst others, meeting all statutory obligations as a grantee under the 1962 Order in exercising its duties and responsibilities arising out of the fishery legislation.

The current 1962 Order operates eight privately leased lays under the several fishery, with the remaining fishery area operating as a regulated fishery. The existing Order expires on 31 March 2022. MSFOMA applied for a new Order to ensure production continues, existing businesses are safeguarded and further investment can take place. The proposed coming into force date of the new Order is 1 April 2022.

In accordance with Schedule 1 of the 1967 Act, the Welsh Ministers have prepared a draft Order. MSFOMA will advertise it in the North Wales Chronicle, Western Mail and the Fishing News on or shortly after Monday 5 April and will circulate it to interested parties. The application, map of the area and draft Order for the proposed Menai Strait (East) Fishery



Menai Strait Fishery Order 1962<u>&</u> <u>Menai Strait Fishery Order 2022</u> Several Fishery Lease Allocation Rules

Leases for Layings - General Policy

- 1. The Menai Strait Fishery Order Management Association shall issue leases for the layings shown in Figure 1 of this document in accordance with the administrative rules set out below.
- 1-2. The Lease Allocation Rules set out in this document apply to any leases for layings issued under the Menai Strait Oyster and Fishery Order 1962 (the "1962 Fishery Order") and to any subsequent Fishery Order made in 2022 (the "2022 Fishery Order") made by Welsh Government that covers all or part of the geographic area of the 1962 Fishery Order
- 2-3. Leases shall only be issued in accordance with the requirements of either the 1962 Menai Strait

 Oyster and Mussel Fishery Order 1962 (the "Fishery Order"), or the 2022 Fishery Order (the "relevant Fishery Order"), the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 (the "Shellfish Act") and any legislation to which the Act and Fishery Orders are subordinate.
- 3.4. Leases shall be issued for a period of not more than 7 years from their start date.
- 4-5. Leases shall terminate on or before the date on which the relevant Fishery Order expires.
- 5.6. Leases may be issued to "lesseetenants" who may be individuals or companies.

Administration

- 6-7. Prior to the expiry of a lease for a laying the Association shall write to the current lesseetenant to determine whether they wish to renew the lease for a further period of up to 7 years.
- 7.8. Leases for layings shall be re-issued to existing lesseetenants providing that:-
 - The lesseetenant has complied with all of the lease conditions for that laying as required by the Association; and
 - The <u>lesseetenant</u> has complied with all of the relevant requirements of the Fishery Order and the Shellfish Act.
- 9. During the transition from the 1962 Fishery Order to the 2022 Fishery Order, the tenant of a laying under the 1962 Fishery Order shall be eligible to lease a new laying under the 2022 Fishery Order in accordance with paragraph 8 above providing that this new laying covers all or part of the same geographic area as the tenant's laying under the 1962 Fishery Order.
- 10. If an existing lesseetenant does not wish to renew their lease or if the requirements of paragraphs (87 & 9) above are not met, the Association will follow the procedure set out below for the vacant laving:-
 - Advertise the opportunity to apply for a lease for this laying on the MSFOMA website and in at least one local newspaper;

- b. Publish the criteria for assessing applications received;
- c. Allow a period of at least 28 days for submission of applications; and
- d. Assess all applications according to the published criteria listed in paragraph (b) above.

Criteria for issuing leases to vacant layings


11. The criteria for issuing leases to vacant layings have been agreed by the Association as follows:-

- 8-a. The lease for the corresponding vacant laying may be offered to Applicants who have submitted an application for a laying in the relevant Fishery Order. They shall be issued in chronological order, such that the applicant who has been waiting longest is the first to be offered a lease.
- 9-b. Invitations issued to applicants by the Association to lease a laying shall be valid for a period of 28 days. If an applicant on the waiting list does not respond to their invitation then after 28 days have elapsed the Association shall invite the next applicant on the waiting list to lease that laying. This process shall be repeated until the invitation has been accepted or the end of the waiting list is reached, whichever is soonest.
- 40-c. Applications for leases must be submitted using the appropriate form published on the MSFOMA website or in writing by post (not by hand) to the Association's registered offices using the appropriate form or by e-mailing the appropriate form to info@msfoma.org.
- 11.d. It shall be each applicant's responsibility to ensure that their contact details are updated to reflect any change in their circumstances. The Association shall not be liable for any loss of opportunity arising from a change in circumstances that it was not aware of.
- 12. The Association shall maintain the waiting list by contacting all of the applicants on the waiting list annually and seeking confirmation that they wish to remain on the waiting list.
- 13. At any meeting of the Association to determine the issuing of leases, the Association shall not be informed of the personal details of any applicant, to ensure that the decisions taken are objective and are not prejudiced in any way.
- 14. These rules shall be reviewed by the Association each year at its Annual General Meeting.

Menai Strait West Fishery Order Application

Background

In 2012 the Association resolved to work with shellfish farmers from the western Menai Strait to renew the Menai Strait West Fishery Order, which lapsed in 2008. An application for renewal of this Fishery was submitted to Welsh Government in 2013. The renewal of the Order is essential to secure the future development of shellfish farming in this area.

A public consultation on the proposal to renew the Menai Strait West Fishery Order was carried out by the Association in October-November 2015. A significant number of objections were submitted. Since then the Association has been working with local stakeholders to address these concerns.

This report provides an update on recent progress.

Recommendations

- 1. That the report is received
- 2. That the proposals for research into Pacific Oysters in the Menai Strait attached at Annex A are discussed.
- 3. That MSFOMA and WG should continue to work together with the aim of producing a revised draft of the proposed new Fishery Order at the earliest opportunity.

1. Update on Renewal of Fishery Order

- 1.1 The Menai Strait (West) Fishery Order was established in 1978 for a period of 30 years. This Fishery Order provided the basis for the development of some oyster and mussel farming activity in the western Strait. The Order lapsed in 2008, preventing the further development of these businesses. An application for renewal of the Order was submitted to Welsh Government by MSFOMA in 2013.
- 1.2 After a series of discussions with Welsh Government officials in the years following this application, a draft Fishery Order was published for consultation in 2015. This consultation generated many objections from the local community. The Association worked closely with the objectors during the period 2015-17 to allay and address their concerns. In July 2017 the Chair of the Association wrote to the Cabinet Secretary to ask her to determine the application for the Fishery Order.
- 1.3 At the March 2019 meeting of the Association it was reported that the Minister for Energy, Planning and Rural Affairs Lesley Griffiths AM had made a commitment to complete the process for making a new Menai West Fishery Order by August 2019.
- 1.4 At the Association meeting in September 2019 WG officials indicated that they were working with lawyers to determine the conditions that would be associated with the Fishery Order. It was anticipated that this would meet the December 2019 deadline proposed by the Minister.

- 1.5 In November 2019 WG officials provided some informal feedback from their legal advisors concerning a condition that could be included in the Order, requiring that Ministerial consent was given for leases before they were issued. This proposal was discussed at the last MSFOMA meeting and considered to be consistent with the approach set out in the 2015 Draft Order.
- 1.6 At the December 2019 Association meeting some concerns were raised by WG officials about the mitigation approach for Pacific oysters. At the April 2020 meeting it was reported that work was still underway to address these issues.
- 1.7 This report provides an update on recent progress with this application.

2. Pacific Oysters

- 2.1 Welsh Government is still working to determine an appropriate approach to managing and mitigating the risk of Pacific oysters (*Crassostrea gigas*) from cultivation areas becoming established in the wild as "feral" oysters (see the previous agenda item for some background on this issue).
- 2.2 MSFOMA representatives discussed the issues concerning Pacific Oysters in detail with WG and NRW officials between December 2019 and July 2020. In July 2020 it was reported that WG Science have produced a draft desk study ("Pacific Oyster Review") of the situation in the Menai Strait, assisted by the University of Bangor. This review was intended provide the evidence base for informing the Habitat Regulations Assessment (HRA) of leases for Pacific oyster cultivation in the Strait. The Review has not yet been published for released.
- 2.3 Welsh Government reported to the Secretariat in March 2021 that they have made no further progress with this issue and have been focussing their resources on the Fishery Order in the eastern Menai Strait.
- 2.4 In an effort to make some progress from our side, the Chair and Secretariat have convened a series of 6 meetings since January 2021 involving the prospective oyster farmers from the western Menai Strait and scientists from the Marine Centre in Menai Bridge. Following the most recent meeting of this group on the 27th May 2021, Prof. Lewis Le Vay has put together an outline of some areas of research into Pacific Oysters that could help to both improve understanding of the risks posed by this species and the mitigation options available.

3. Consultation with stakeholders

3.1 It has been noted at meetings over the past 2 years that the Association is keen to engage with stakeholders to raise awareness about progress and the content of a new Fishery Order at the earliest opportunity. In the absence of certainty about either the content or timescale for a new Fishery Order, it is still not considered prudent to initiate stakeholder engagement.

Proposed research project

Pacific oyster abundance and reproductive potential in the Menai Strait

Background

One of the key shellfish species produced in the Menai West Order area is the Pacific oyster Crassostrea gigas, which is also potentially a species of interest in the future for the eastern Menai Strait area. The Pacific oyster C. gigas is a non-native species that has considerably expanded its range forming naturalised populations following introductions into Europe in the 1960s. Initially it was thought C. gigas was incapable of spawning in the non-native low temperature waters of the UK. However, after a century of environmental conditioning C. gigas has had a number of successful spawns and settlement events in the lower latitude regions of the UK, particularly in the South of England. The aquaculture industry is aware of the potential impact of expansion from these wild C. gigas populations and has countered the anomaly through the production of chemically and genetically cultured triploid Pacific oysters. This method has proved largely successful in curbing the spawning capabilities of C. gigas. Nonetheless, concerns still exist within government and environmental stakeholders that rising sea temperatures and incomplete triploid transformation may lead to population spread of this cultured species. This represents a barrier to expansion of the shellfish industry in the Menai Strait (and across Wales), where uncertainty and lack of evidence is delaying both renewals of fisheries orders and approval of new production areas.

The Pacific oyster was introduced into the Menai Strait for trials in the 1960s. A survey in 1994 found *C. gigas* along the Menai Strait at several locations but in low abundance in small isolated patches and not established as an invasive population. This is thought to be due to sea temperatures in the Strait rarely reaching the prolonged periods of elevated temperatures required for successful spawning and settlement.

The proposed research aims/outputs

1. Data on current feral Pacific oyster population in the Menai Strait

An intertidal survey to assess the abundance and distribution of Pacific oysters, providing a comparison with survey data from 1994. Analysis of population size frequency will be used to assess likely settlement history, and samples will be taken to assess reproductive condition.

2. Potential for spawning by feral Pacific oysters

Previous studies (Malham et al 2019) have investigated likelihood of spawning events based on modelled seawater temperatures. This work will be repeated and informed by additional seawater temperature data collected from CTD recording of sea-surface temperatures in Menai Bridge and intertidal temperature monitoring, which will assess more accurately the temperature regime that oysters are exposed to. This will allow an updated assessment of the potential for spawning currently and into the future

3. Dispersal potential from spawning feral oysters

Previous work on modelling dispersal for Pacific oysters conducted for Welsh Government will be reviewed to identify potential range of settlement of Pacific oysters originating in the Menai Strait.

4. Review of effectiveness of triploid oysters in reducing reproductive potentials

The use of triploid oysters to stock aquaculture sites has been used to mitigate the potential for reproduction by farmed stock contributing to the establishment of wild populations. Triploid oysters are considered to be infertile, and may be produced using two main methods through a shock treatment such as chemical, heat or pressure, or via crossing tetraploid males with diploid females. The use of tetraploid parents is thought to be the most reliable method for producing sterile triploid offspring, with the other methods producing a proportion of offspring that may be diploid and able to breed. A desk study will review evidence of the effectiveness of currently available methods of triploid production in Pacific oysters, the potential for incomplete conversion (ie proportion of diploid offspring) or the potential for reversion for triploids to diploids and the potential for triploid oysters to be reproductively viable via breeding with diploids.

5. Predictive population modelling for diploid vs triploid oysters

Intertidal survey data for feral diploid *C. gigas* assemblages will be analysed using a Gunderson population model to predict the larval output from these oysters and the potential post-spawn settlement densities. The highest density sites from the intertidal survey will be revisited to ascertain if the current *in-situ* oyster population numbers match those of the model.

To predict the potential spawning output from a future farmed triploid oyster stocks a corresponding model will be undertaken using exisiting and proposed oyster production areas in the Menai West Several Order area as larval sources and the high-density sites (see above) as potential settlement zones. The potential settlement arising from diploid and triploid farmed stock will be compared, to assess the potential effectiveness of triploid oysters as a mitigation measure.

6. Assessing Larval Retention Sites for Long-term Monitoring

In conjunction with the intertidal survey data and the predictive population modelling, a data layered Arc View[©] GIS map will be created as a monitoring tool for feral *C. gigas* outputs. The hydrodynamic and substrate type layers also of the map will also prove valuable in monitoring any potential settlements from future culture plots. Any future monitoring of settlement would be separate project

Research Proposal: Water Quality

Background

The water quality of the Menai Strait is affected by runoff from the adjacent land and waste water discharges. The runoff and discharges can affect both water quality and the shellfish hygiene classification for the mussels cultivated in the Menai Strait.

There is a very high commercial interest in understanding how water quality may affect shellfish hygiene classification and hence whether (or not) mussels from the area my be exported to the EU.

A research proposal has been prepared by Prof. Lewis Le Vay to identify opportunities for improving both water quality and shellfish hygiene classification in the Menai Strait. This is attached for information at Annex A.

Recommendations

- 1. That the Association considers the research proposal attached at Annex A.
- 2. That the Association considers giving its support to this proposal.

Proposed research project

Microbial source tracking in the Menai Strait, North Wales


Background

The Menai East Several Order, in the eastern end of the Menai Strait contains historically one of the largest mussel fisheries in the UK. The area is affected by urban wastewater, however, agricultural and wildlife contamination may also affect the microbial quality. Most of the area have good quality mussels, however, due to occasionally high *E. coli* counts, most areas are classified as B. Bangor Mussel Producers, the cooperative of companies that operate the mussel production leases within the Several Order depend on exports to the EU, which since EU-exit requires that imported shellfish originate from class A waters. Thus there is very high commercial interest in understanding the causes and patterns of *E coli* contamination in the area to help:

- i) identify potential improvements to the classification
- ii) inform potential future adaptation of the classification regime- eg adaptive management where high risk harvesting periods are avoided, using either environmental risk predictors (eg rainfall) and/or CSO operation alerts
- iii) identify best options for water quality improvement eg catchment agricultural land management changes and/or waste water infrastructure

The current classification is based on the analysis of shellfish samples taken monthly, which does not sufficiently explore the magnitude and frequency of microbial contamination and the effect of high-risk weather events. Furthermore, it lacks information on whether the pollution is human waste or agricultural-related. This project will help to identify the periods when pollution peaks as well as inform on the source of contamination and the duration of contamination wash-off.

The figure on the left shows the sites where environmental health officers takes shellfish samples on a monthly basis for classification.



Project objectives

The work would focus on the Ogwen RMP, which reports the highest frequency of high *E coli* results and which appears to be most directly affected by catchment run-off (potential both sewage and agricultural sources)

- Providing high frequency data on the concentrations of indicator bacteria and human faecal indicator virus in water and shellfish in the Menai Strait (Owgen RM) to assess temporal patterns
- 2. Assessment of the relative contribution of of human vs. agricultural pollution using viral indicators.
- 3. Identify potential benefits from improvements to agricultural land management and waste water infrastructure
- 4. Assessment of the fate, transport and die-off of pathogens in shellfish during/after high-risk events
- Assessment of the potential for predicting water quality and shellfish hygiene using environmental predictors (eg rainfall, river flow) and data/alerts on CSO discharges.

Project description

Over a 12 month period, water and shellfish samples will be collected at the Ogwen RMP and the Ogwen estuary in the Menai Strait. Water and shellfish samples will be collected every 1-2 weeks and, when possible, more frequently for short periods before and after high risk events (e.g. heavy rainfall).

Shellfish and water samples will be tested for faecal indicator bacteria (total coliform, *E. coli* and *Enterococci*). The shellfish samples taken biweekly will also be tested for a human faecal indicator virus (crAssphage) to assess the source of contamination. Samples taken before and after high risk events will be tested for indicator viruses (e.g. human and animal adenovirus, crAssphage, FRNA phages) and human pathogenic to assess the proportion of agricultural vs. human contamination and potential health risks. Water samples will also be analysed for nutrients.

The results will enable the assessment of the level of pollution and the effectiveness of environmental and CSO alert predictors on water quality and shellfish hygiene. Furthermore, viral indicators will identify the level of human vs. animal contamination due to human wastewater discharge and agricultural activities, respectively. This will help provide a baseline for potential improvements resulting from agricultural management changes in the catchment and will help inform Welsh Water regarding any potential future improvements in waste water infrastructure and flow monitoring .

The benefits to the mussel fishery in the Menai Strait will be significant, in identifying interventions required to improve environmental quality and reduce risk of microbial contamination of shellfish. The results will also inform wider development of assurance schemes for management of human health risk from shellfish in Wales, based on environmental predictors of risk - with the Menai Strait being a case study of how such a scheme can operate with demonstrating benefits in terms of potential to reduce periods of closure.
