You raise a good question – and one that over the years there has been both a lot of concern and misunderstanding about.

The proposed new Fishery Order will not affect the moorings in Beaumaris Bay at all. Concerns have been raised by boat owners in the past that the Fishery Order makes the moorings illegal. This is not the case. We have met with both Beaumaris Town Council and Ynys Môn County Council to discuss the new Fishery Order and this issue was raised at both meetings – in each case we were able to reassure the Councils that the moorings in Beaumaris Bay will be unaffected.

Our Customer Services Team received your letter regarding the formal consultation for the Menai Strait (East) Proposed Fishery Order and forwarded it to me for response.

We include the existing shellfish beds on Admiralty Chart 1464 (the limits were amended on the latest New Edition, published August 2020).

The proposal is to make a new Fishery Order with the same extents when the existing one expires next year. We therefore require to be informed of the outcome of the consultation in order that we can take appropriate action (retain or remove the shellfish beds) on Admiralty charts and in Admiralty publications.

We suggest that in the Statutory Instrument 'Description of the Order area', the Coordinate Reference System used to define positions is explicitly stated.


We also suggest that you should consult the Maritime & Coastguard Agency (Technical Services Navigation Branch) if you have not already done so.

Menai Strait (East) Proposed Fishery Order

Response from Dr Sue Utting (retired shellfish scientist/aquaculture advisor and previous independent Chair of MSFOMA from October 2010 to October 2017)

When I finished my term as Chair of MSFOMA, negotiations for the renewal of this Fishery Order had just begun so I was delighted to see that the draft Order has been published for wider consultation. The proposed Fishery Order is fundamental for the protection of what has become an extremely successful shellfish production area for mussels in Wales, recognised nationally and internationally for its productivity and importance to the coastal economy. Leaseholders within the proposed Several Order area must have the legal protection and security of their stock, from the relaying of seed through to harvest, that the Fishery Order will continue to provide.

It is essential that this Fishery Order is renewed in 2022 to protect the considerable amount of finance and time that has been invested by the producers (leaseholders and licence holders) in making this the highly efficient industry that it has become. Although it will be for a period of 35 years only, as opposed to 60 years in the current Fishery Order, anything less would not guarantee the continued investment that will be needed for individual businesses to operate efficiently into the future and provide them with the stability they need.

My response takes into account the following:

- 1. The Menai Strait Fishery Order Management Association (MSFOMA), the Grantee of the proposed Fishery Order has established a track record, over the last 11 years from when it was set up in 2010 to the present, to manage effectively the current Fishery Order that will end in 2022. Therefore, I have every confidence that this good management will continue under the proposed Fishery Order. MSFOMA has Directors, Members and Observers at its meetings that represent a diverse range of local stakeholders with the extent and level of expertise and knowledge that is needed to effectively manage mussel production in the area. MSFOMA has a website, giving timely information on its management practices and decisions, which is open to public scrutiny.
- 2. The proposed Fishery Order contains many checks and balances within it to ensure that the cultivation of mussels can continue economically and efficiently while complying with the legislation that is in place to protect the environment and conservation interests of the area. For example, within the Several Order areas, the Welsh Government or anyone authorised by them will have access to monitor the leaseholders' compliance with the lease requirements, catch returns will have to be provided to Welsh Government on an annual basis, leases will have to be renewed by leaseholders every 7 years. Similarly, with licence applicants under the Regulated Order areas there will be regular monitoring.
- 3. For many years, the mussel industry has been involved in research (financially and 'in kind') into good working practices that not only make production more efficient but that ensure requirements for environmental and conservation legislation are met. This will continue.

- 4. The proposed Fishery Order will not bring in any changes to the rights of landowners, stakeholders and other users of the designated area.
- 5. Finally, there are three other important points that should be taken into account. The cultivation of mussels is one of the most efficient methods of producing protein. We have a flagship industry in the Menai Strait we can be proud of that will go a long way in helping to produce affordable food for the future, for the people of Wales, the UK and for export. Also, mussels are a sink for excess carbon dioxide, which something of relevance to us all, and they help to improve water quality. Therefore, it is very important that this proposed Fishery Order be renewed.

Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 – Formal Consultation Under Schedule 1 Eastern Menai Strait: New Fishery Order for Shellfish Farming

I am writing to consult you on a proposal to make a new "Fishery Order" in the eastern Menai Strait. The purpose of this new Fishery Order is to enable shellfish farming to continue in the Menai Strait just as it does today when the existing Fishery Order expires next year.

The new Fishery Order has been drafted by the Welsh Ministers in response to a formal application submitted by the Menai Strait Fishery Order Management Association ("MSFOMA") under the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967. The Welsh Ministers have instructed MSFOMA to carry out this consultation on the Draft Order.

The purpose of the new Fishery Order is to allow existing shellfish farming to continue in the eastern end of the Strait. The new Order will not impose any new restrictions or controls on existing day-to-day activities in the area. For shellfish famers this new Fishery Order is vital for their future. For everyone else in the area it will be very much "business as usual".

In accordance with the Ministers' instructions, we are writing to consult with you and other interested parties. We have also issued Public Notices in the Fishing News, Western Mail and Daily Post, and have posted notices at locations around the eastern Menai Strait.

I attach a copy of the Public Notice for your information. Additional information, including an electronic copy of the <u>Draft Order</u> and map of the area concerned, is also available on the MSFOMA website (<u>www.msfoma.org</u>). If you would like a paper copy of any of these documents please contact us and we will send them to you free of charge.

The consultation period for this Fishery Order will extend from 8th April 2021 – 8th May 2021. If you have any comments that you would like the Minister to consider before making this Order, please can you send them to <u>both</u> Welsh Government and MSFOMA at the following addresses:-

Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 – Formal Consultation Under Schedule 1 Eastern Menai Strait: New Fishery Order for Shellfish Farming submitted by the Menai Strait Fishery Order Management Association ("MSFOMA").

North Wales Wildlife Trust (NWWT) are the only local organisation dedicated to conserving all habitats and species across North Wales for the enjoyment of people and the benefit of wildlife. We work with 45 other Wildlife Trusts, and are part of the largest voluntary organisation dedicated to conserving all of the UK's habitats and species, whether in the countryside, towns or at sea. We improve places for wildlife, and strengthen the relationship between people and the natural environment of North Wales by promoting its value to local people. Our aim is to protect and create resilient ecosystems on land and in the sea. The following representation is collated and presented on behalf of NWWT's Marine Advisory Group (MAG).

The Menai Strait has long been known for its rich variety of marine life, recognised by the fact that in 2004 it was designated as a marine Special Area of Conservation (SAC), confirming it as one of the most important sites for marine wildlife in Europe. The area also has a number of Sites of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), which reflect the national importance of the area for marine wildlife. Two Special Protection Areas (SPA) also occur within the Menai Strait, at Traeth Lafan and Puffin Island, recognising the importance of the area for a variety of bird species.

Due to its sheltered environment and strong currents the eastern Menai Strait offers a suitable site for shellfish growing. Historically, the Menai Strait would have supported a large number of shellfish and there are natural beds nearby. The relaying of mussels has increased the overall area dominated by mussels in the low shore and subtidal. Studies have shown that the mussel dominated ground is slightly more biodiverse than the "natural" seabed and also supports other wildlife as a food source. During filter feeding they extract particulate matter from the sea water and produce faecal and pseudofaecal pellets which generally accumulate as mussel mud on the seabed. In the process they have a major role in controlling the level of suspended sediment in the Strait and may actually be beneficial to water clarity. It has been estimated that the mussels in the recent past filtered approximately a third of the residual flow (net flow of water which exits at the Southern end) of the Menai Strait.

NWWT supports the careful use of the Menai Strait for shellfish cultivation and support MSFOMA's application for renewal of the Fishery Order.

We would also like to take this opportunity to highlight the need for the enhancement of water quality in the Menai Strait.

NWWT considers that current water quality of the Menai Strait is unsatisfactory. This is particularly relevant to the shellfish industry as their exports to Europe are now intimately linked to water quality.

The Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs (DEFRA) and European Commission have confirmed that live bivalve molluscs can continue to be exported if they are harvested from Class A waters. Currently, water quality in the Menai Strait is classified as B. In addition, the Menai Strait and rivers flowing into it are subjected to a significant number of storm water overflow events which can impact water quality.

It is very likely that additional measures to prevent at least some of these overflows would be required to improve water quality sufficiently to reach an A grade water quality which would also have an overall benefit for the Strait. However, additional measures relating to agricultural pollution would almost certainly be required particularly due to agriculture being a significant source of e-coli and other pollutants.

NWWT believes that the nature conservation status of the Menai Strait would benefit significantly from the same improvements in water quality needed by the shellfish industry.

Dear Welsh Government,

Menai Strait (East) Proposed Fishery Order

- The Menai Strait Fishery Order Management Association (the Grantee) have applied to the Welsh Government for a new Regulating and Several Order, under the Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 (as amended). This order would confer on them both the right of regulating a fishery and of a several fishery for blue mussel and oyster in the eastern Menai Strait.
- 2. Thank you for consulting Natural Resources Wales (NRW) on the draft text of the Menai Strait (East) Oyster and Mussel Fishery Order 2022 (2022 Order).
- The following comments are made in the context of NRW's role as the Appropriate Nature Conservation Body under the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017 as amended (2017 Regulations) and the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981.
- 4. Explanatory note, Paragraph 1 states 'the prescribed species are mussels and oysters'. For the avoidance of doubt could the full scientific names of the species be included here.
- 5. Mytilus edulis (or blue mussel) is defined at 'species' level within Article 2, Interpretation. However, oyster is defined at 'family' level, 'ostreidae', which includes

over 100 species of oysters. It would be preferable to identify the species of oyster to be farmed in the 2022 Order, even if more than one.

- 6. NRW support the inclusion of processes within the 2022 Order which require Welsh Ministers to have regards to the impacts on both the 'special area of conservation' and the 'marine environment' before they consent to the:
 - Designation of an area (Article 5(4) b and c);
 - Cancelation of a designation (Article 7(3) b and c);
 - Granting of a lease (Article 9(3) b and c); and
 - Regulations made by the Grantee under Article 20 (Article 21(3) b and c).
- 7. Before consenting to any of the above, the Welsh Ministers as Competent Authority under Article 7 of the 2017 Regulations are required to complete a Habitats Regulation Assessment (HRA) under Article 63 of the 2017 Regulations.
- 8. NRW advise the interpretation of 'special area of conservation' as the Menai Strait and Conwy Bay Special Area of Conservation is too narrow in scope with respect to the HRA process.
- 9. While it is acknowledged that the proposed boundaries of the Fishery Order are wholly within the Menai Strait and Conwy Bay Special Area of Conservation, the potential impacts from proposed fishery activities could affect a range of mobile species protected under other national site network designations. These mobile species will need to be considered within any HRA. Other sites in the national site network that would need to be considered could include but are not limited to:
 - Traeth Lafan Special Protection Area (oystercatcher)
 - Liverpool Bay Special Protection Area (red-throated diver, common scoter etc.)
 - North Anglesey Marine Special Area of Conservation (harbour porpoise)
 - Pen Llŷn ar Sarnau Special Area of Conservation (bottlenose dolphin)
- 10. Further, if any of the activities associated with the 2022 Order potentially affect a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) then Welsh Ministers should notify NRW and request advice under Section 28I of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981.
- 11. To address points 8 to 10 above, NRW advise the relevant parts of the 2022 Order referenced in point 6 above that relate to Welsh Ministers roles are amended to include a consideration of impacts on the wider national site network and SSSIs.
- 12. The 2022 Order needs to explain what the intent of the consideration of impacts on the 'marine environment' means in practice. For example, does it include impacts on landscape, seascape, navigation etc. and if so, under what statutory processes?

- The reference in Article 2, Interpretation, of the 2022 Order to 'regulation 11 of the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2010' needs updating to regulation 13 of the 2017 Regulations.
- 14. When the Grantee is exercising their licensing functions under Articles 16 and 20 of the 2022 Order, they must have regard to the impact the licensed activities they authorise on the 'special area of conservation' and the 'marine environment'. Does this mean the Grantee is also a Competent Authority under Article 7 of the 2017 Regulations?
- 15. Additionally, NRW also advise that reference to 'special area of conservation' in Article 16 is updated to include a consideration of impacts on the wider national site network and SSSIs.
- 16. NRW, in line with Welsh Government's position on INNS, discourage the farming of invasive non-native species (INNS) such as Pacific oyster. Welsh Government support a strong emphasis on the prevention of introduction of INNS in the marine environment. Any proposed shellfish development in Wales, in addition to complying with current regulations¹, needs to satisfy the conservation objectives of all features within that particular area, as specified in the 2017 Regulations. The adoption of an INNS management strategy containing preventative monitoring and eradicating measures should also be required as a condition of granting a lease or approving regulations made by the Grantee.
- 17. The farming of Pacific oyster would need to be fully considered in the relevant HRA process. Our initial advice here is without prejudice to later advice we may provide on those considerations.
- 18. Finally, there are a few minor typographical errors:
 - Mytilus edulis is spelt incorrectly in Article 2, Interpretation.
 - Lease is spelt incorrectly in Article 11
 - Licensee is spelt incorrectly in Articles 17 and 18.
 - Publicly is spelt incorrectly in Article 22.



I am writing on behalf of the North West Venturers Yacht Club Ltd. (NWVYC) in response to the above consultation.

The NWVYC is situated at the Eastern end of the Menai Strait, South West of Beaumaris. The aims of the club are to encourage cruising in sailing boats and the study of the principles of Navigation and Seamanship. We have 140 members, sailing 71 cruising yachts, many of which are based in the Menai Strait.

Our concern relates to the moorings in the Straits which are situated within the Fishery. The lessor of the moorings is Ynys Mon County Council. We request that the Minister consider the points below before renewing the Fishery Order as it stands. The NWVYC propose that areas leased to moorings are removed from the designation of the above order before it is renewed. The future of our club in Beaumaris depends upon the provision of moorings in the Strait.

- 1. The NWVYC have no wish to damage the business of the mussel/oyster fishermen who farm the Eastern End of the Strait. We appreciate that the fishery is important to the economic well-being of the area.
- 2. Many NWVYC members lease moorings, both drying and deep-water, within the Eastern end of the Menai Strait. All the deep water moorings and some of the drying moorings are within the boundary of the Fishery. The availability of deep water moorings is essential to members with fin keeled boats.
- 3. In order to ensure the sustainability of our club into the future, it is essential that we are able to recruit new members. The continuing availability of moorings, both deep water and drying, in the Eastern Strait encourages the recruitment of new members.

In addition, our member's moorings are used by visitors to the area when they are vacant.

- 4. Uncertainty over the area within the fishery order that is leased to moorings could inhibit investment, both by our club, related businesses and more widely.
- 5. Whilst, in the short term, we welcome the promise of the mussel fishermen not to lift the moorings within the Fishery, having certainty of the long term position would enable the NWVYC to make better decisions for the future. In different circumstances, or if a new business were to take over the mussel fishery, this promise may not be upheld. Following Brexit, the business which currently operates the mussel fishery is stating that they cannot continue within the new regulations.
- 6. The mussel fishermen are not currently cultivating, and never have cultivated the ground within the Fishery leased to moorings, nor do they maintain it in any way. This begs the question Why does the fishery wish to retain control of an area they have no intention of farming?

Whilst the above points relate specifically to the NWVYC, it also needs to be understood that many of the moorings are leased to other businesses and individuals. The boating and tourist community collectively contribute much to the economic viability of the area, and this would be lost, should the moorings be lifted.

Please could you also ask the various mussel fishery fishermen, with rights adjacent to our foreshore, to stop trespassing on it.


The area of the Baron Hill foreshore is marked ORANGE on the attached plan.

As Commodore of The Conway Club Cruising Association I write to object to the proposed fishery, as designated.

- 1. I wonder if at the appropriate time with environmental legislation and protected marine areas nearby if it is still satisfactory to dredge the seabed, causing damage. Long strips of discoloured water can be seen in the sea following dredging.
- 2. There have been damage to the sandbanks in the area, in that the mouth of the River Ogwen has been diverted and the profile of the sandbanks off Beaumaris have changed with consequences that have not been established.
- 3. I wonder what effect the fishery has on the cockles and if the two are not compatible and there should be no order over the cockle beds.
- 4. Clearly there cannot be a fishery in the navigable channel and this area should be removed from the Fishery. I believe the current navigation marks are not permitted in a Fishery.
- 5. Beaumaris Pier has been extended and this area needs to be removed from any fishery.
- 6. In the bay opposite Beaumaris, it is shown on the Admiralty chart as an area you can anchor, this is not possible in a Fishery and the area should be removed.
- 7. RAYC have racing buoys (6) in the area and these cannot be laid in a fishery so areas to accommodate this should be removed from the fishery.
- 8. All the Moorings in Beaumaris Bay leased from the Council lie in the Fishery. This area has never been cultivated and the area to the North of the Channel in Beaumaris should be removed from the Fishery to Gallows point.
- 9. There are currently moorings by Glyn Garth and these need to be protected by removing them from the Fishery.
- 10. There are mooring to the South of Bangor Pier (mainland side) and this area should be removed from the fishery.

Basically the Fishery if it were to be granted, at all, should be of a reduced area taking all the above into account, accommodating the other users as is required under the Welsh Marine Plan.

Menai Strait (East) Oyster and Mussel Fishery Order 2022

I refer to the consultation on the renewal of the existing Fishery Order for a further 35 years.

The existing Fishery Order has long been a cause for contention between the users of many moorings in the North Eastern Menai Strait and the Mussel fishery.

The satellite image overleaf shows the many moorings which currently lie within the boundary of the fishery (which looks like it was taken early in the season and so significantly underestimates the number of moorings affected). These moorings are on the northern side of the deep water channel and are in an area which has never been used for mussel cultivation and where moorings were located prior to the 1962 order.

As things stand the grantee could apply to include the area of the moorings within the several fishery area and it would be open to the minister to determine this without formal consultation. This effectively leaves a sword of Damocles hanging over the future use of the moorings and sailing based in Beaumaris.

Clearly the most satisfactory solution to the problem would be to redefine the northern boundary of the fishery to the southern side of the area containing all currently licensed moorings off the Anglesey shoreline..

In Beaumaris Bay this would logically be to move the boundary from the northern side of the navigable channel to the southern side. This would have an additional benefit of allowing the Port Hand Markers of the channel to act as markers for the northern boundary of the fishery in this area.

Over the years the grantees have provided assurances that the areas in question are not used and will not be used for mussel cultivation. While such assurances are welcome we must be mindful of the fact that the new order is to last for 35 years, during which time much will change, including very possibly the ownership of the fisheries.





These seeding beds have been reseeded season on season and an unnatural bed has formed which has altered the drainage of the Hireal bay and garth point mud flat's. In my opinion, this has altered the mud flat's to a wet slimy sticky mess instead of the firm compacted mud flat's off the past. I have also noticed a decline, if not vanishing, wild life in this area as I have seen no more flounder , plaice , eels , worm casts and wading birds.

I am writing on behalf of the Menai Strait Fishery Order Management Association (MSFOMA) to let you know about a formal consultation that we are due to start next week that may be of interest to you.

Just after Easter we will be publishing a new "Draft Fishery Order" for the eastern Menai Strait. The proposed new Order will allow shellfish farming to continue in the eastern Menai Strait. It will replace the existing Order that was made in 1962 and which is due to expire at the end of March 2022.

The proposed new Order has been drafted by Welsh Government. Its only purpose is to allow existing shellfish farming to continue in the eastern end of the Strait. The new Order will not impose any new restrictions or controls

on existing day-to-day activities in the area. For shellfish famers this new Fishery Order is vital for their future. For everyone else in the area it will be very much "business as usual".

We have put some background information about the proposal to renew this Fishery Order on our website already, which you can access <u>here</u>.

The public consultation on the new Fishery Order will run for a month, ending in early May. Right now we are working to put all of the arrangements in place for the consultation. Next week we will be publishing notices in the Daily Post, Western Mail, and Fishing News and also sending out information by e-mail and post.

I am one of the existing mussel farmers within the boundaries of the existing fishery order. This order, granted for a period of sixty year in 1962 (as amended in 1964), experienced periods of great activity interspersed by periods of little. Such is the way when working with the natural flows and cycles of the environment.

The cultivation of bivalve molluscs such as mussels is widely acknowledged as one the more environmentally benign ways of producing animal based protein - it falls within the description of activities described as extensive cultivation - that is, it is reliant on nature to provide the seed mussels settlements on which the activity depends, the food for mussels to consume as they grow and the substrate for the mussel to attach to, as they hunker down from some of the ravages of the weather and predation. Our intervention mostly consists of the application of informed husbandry practice and the regular introduction of the juvenile seed mussel to the growing plots. The rest is left to nature.

That this organic and sustainable activity has been able to employ the many people it has over the period of the current order, has been a part of the production of an enviable and detailed research evidence base and has produced many tens of thousands of tonnes of substantia of highly nutritious food is pretty much entirely down to the existence of the legal mechanism provides for through the application of a Fishery order. This has allowed for the natural periodic cycles of the environment to be accommodated within the operational planning of the undertakings who have been engaged in cultivation, allowing decisions to be made on the basis of balance between the long term good and any pressing short term need.

The Menai Strait is an area long known for its bewildering beauty, of precious natural jewels. IT is however also an area that has demonstrated the much more modern concept of spatial mutli use over many decades, with mussel cultivation co-existing alongside all the other users of the area, both leisure and commercial, all without adversely impacting on the overall amenity values associated with this special place. None of which occur with a compromise to the natural environment on which they all depend.

The provision of a new order will allow for the next generation of shellfish cultivators to come and apply their practices, develop new approaches and technologies and maybe even continue to enhance the wider research base and understanding, whilst knowing that they too will not be forced into a corner of making hasty decisions associated with any tenure utilization of the ground.

Of course I wholeheartedly support the application to provide for the new fishery order.

Sea Fisheries (Shellfish) Act 1967 (as amended) Menai Strait (East) Oyster and Mussel Fishery Order 2022

The following is the Royal Yachting Association (RYA) response to the *Sea Fisheries (Shellfish)* Act 1967 (as amended) Menai Strait (East) Oyster and Mussel Fishery Order 2022 consultation.

The Menai Strait is an important recreational waterway both in terms of providing a shorter passage between Conwy, Bardsey Island and Ceredigion Bay; but also in its own right. The existing and proposed Order area lies within a moderate to high-moderate intensity recreation use region for craft using the North Wales coastal route.


It should be noted that the RYA bases recreational intensity on Automatic Identification System (AIS) returns for the area (over multiple years). In addition, we have reviewed the 2017 AIS tracks as an indication of routes taken by recreational craft. This is the most recent year of full AIS data for the area, provided by the MMO, and broadly accords with the RYA AIS intensity data (Figure 1). The 2017 data indicates that approximately 15% of vessels, equipped with AIS, that pass through the Order area are recreational craft.

It is likely that in this area less than 10-15% of recreational craft carry AIS¹, so it is probable that recreational activity will be higher and more extensive than the AIS indicates. This is denoted by the identification of the Menai Strait as a General Boating Area by local clubs for craft not equipped with AIS (Figure 2).

Clubs in the area include: the Royal Anglesey Yacht Club, North West Ventures Yacht Club, University College of Wales Bangor Sailing Club and Menai Bridge Boat Club. It is likely that clubs and training establishments in the western half of the Straits also use the Order area (e.g. Plas Menai). Smaller recreational craft (<25 metres) are likely to range more widely within the area, particularly at high tide across Bangor Flats/ Traeth Lafan.

Combined, the General Boating Area and AIS data indicates that fisheries activity and recreational traffic may pose a navigational hazard to each other. The RYA notes that Article 16 requires the Grantee to have regard to matters when exercising their licensing functions. Given the recreational use of the area, the RYA recommend that Article 16 include:

(c) Safety of Navigation.

The RYA note that Article 22 places a duty to keep a publicly available illustrative map of the Order area. To minimise potential inadvertent conflicts between uses, particularly fundus/ seabed/ landowners and lease holders, the RYA recommends that the map should include leases within the area (e.g. moorings). Similarly, we recommend that Article 16 include:

(d) Other fundus/ leaseholders.

We recommend that Article 16 support Article 26 on this issue. However, it should be noted that one of our affiliated clubs, North West Ventures, has indicated that their area of moorings in Beaumaris Bay should be excluded from the Fishery Order Area. The Club will be responding on their own behalf.

I write to to you because I believe this to be a major matter for the Welsh Assembly and ask you <u>not</u> to extend temporal life of the Menai Strait East Fishery which should not be allowed in an SSI an SPA and SAC.

The Fishery is unsatisfactory in it's Commerce, Contribution to the Green policy, Ecology, Effect on local trade, and Governance

Commerce The waters of the East Menai Strait are not pure. Mussel fishermen used to run purification tanks at Bangor, but changed to using Dutch waters for cleansing. There are reports of Dutch objections to this in the past and, post-Brexit, the fishermen can no longer do this.

There would be no point in authorising a Fishery from which the products could not be offered for sale

UK's green policy The "Marine Conservation Society" and "Rewilding Britain" seek the ending of bottom trawling or dredging which, if banned from existing conservation areas, would safeguard an estimated 55 million tonnes of carbon and allow the seabed to recover. [Times 4/5/21]

Ecology To end the East Menai Fishery would solve many problem and be in accordance with the scientific study by Smith and Shackly that concluded that industrial mussel farming is injurious to the natural habitat.

Before mussel farming, the Traeth Lafan, the main part of the Fishery, was a golden sandbank where cockles were harvested for shipment to Liverpool. Indeed the local nickname for Beaumaris is "Cockletown". Traeth Lafan is now one vast mud bank of mussel faeces and pseudo-faeces.

This mud spreads thousands of metres beyond the boundary of the Fishery – as can be seen in the black and white aerial photographs held by the Senedd.

The licences issued to mussel fishermen forbad the introduction into the Fishery of material from elsewhere, without the specific permission of the Welsh Assembly. Yet it has been normal for them to import young mussels, often from Morecambe Bay.

The introduction of foreign species has led to the unwanted importation of undesirables such as s Slipper Limpets.

The outspoken intentions and actions of the fishermen to remove all crabs from the Fishery has changed the native environment where, now, only juvenile crabs are seen.

A result of their actions has been a very significant reduction in the birdlife. WeBS reported in 2056;

Great Crested Grebe	520 - 45
Oystercatcher	4,000 - 540
Curlew	1,,400-750
Wintering Duck	1,500 - 600

Beaumaris Town Councillors reported the disappearance of Bass fish from the "Swash", an inlet on Traeth Lafan.

In addition to the attempted extermination of crabs, the mussel men dislike the starfish "Stichastrella Rosca", which is a nationally scarce species.

Effect on local trade

The mussel fishermen have little effect on local trade as they employ few people, their product is sold abroad, very profitably, and their boats are not built here.

Because the law does not allow the laying of moorings in a Fishery – and this is acknowledged by Ynys Mon County Council, which leases the moorings, - Beaumaris is unable to develop it's commercial potential.

This matter can be resolved very simply, by not renewing the Fishery or by changing it's boundaries.

The latter could be done at no cost. A new northern boundary to the Fishery could be aligned with the southern edge of the international navigation channel from south of Gallows Point, thereby removing the area of Beaumaris' moorings from the Fishery.

This change would not inconvenience the mussel fishermen as they have never used this area, have told Beaumaris Town Council that they do not intend to and, further, have been instructed by the High Court that they may not do so as the area was used for moorings before the Fishery was created.

Governance The oversight and control of the Fishery has not been good.

It was established under a Sea Fisheries Act that required all concerned parties to be consulted ..

The minutes of the Harbour Board of the Borough of Beaumaris show that it was not consulted, though Queen Elizabeth I had given control of these waters to Beaumaris.

These waters are now controlled by MSFOMA on which the mussel fishermen lessees play a major part.

Mr Wilson, Director of MSFOMA told Albert Owen MP, the Development Director of the Royal Anglesey Yacht Club and myself that they "could rip out the Beaumaris moorings at any time they liked", Under the law he was correct – alas - but his outburst indicates the need for change.

MSFOMA described the application for renewal as "business as usual", disregarding the present shortcomings, it's failure to communicate with all interested parties or the previous years' objections to it's actions.

I am aware of the qualifications of the lease holders - Member North Wales Sea Fisheries Committee; Welsh Assembly Government Appointee; Marine Stewardship Award for Responsible Fishing, etc, but still think that the local needs of Beaumaris and of the local ecology must be considered and the adverse effect of the present farming process removed, not left to lessee to determine

I note that the mussel fishermen have powerful friends who have permitted the enlargement of their boats to twice the length originally approved by CCW, with consequential greater disturbance of the sea bed, particularly when some half of the dredged material is unwanted and thrown back.

I recommend that the licence for the East Menai Fishery should not be renewed, or if renewed should by altered significantly.

The minimum alterations must be;

a. A thorough scientific appraisal of the effect of such industrial action in protected areas and oi how the product from these waters can be made saleable

b. A reduction in the size of the Fishery to exclude Beaumaris' moorings.
